The Sponsor a Student Scholarship Program recognizes students for their academic and leadership qualities. Sponsors are matched with a student who will communicate with their sponsor throughout the school year on academic progress, programs and projects, and classroom experiences. Personal meetings are encouraged with the sponsors and the student. A reception is typically held in which the sponsor, the student, and their families are invited and recognized.

Investment opportunities for this program range from \$10,000 for a full-year sponsorship to \$2,500 for a quarter-year sponsorship. Funds are applied directly to the instructional costs of the student while enrolled at NativityMiguel School of Scranton.

Donors can contribute annually and are encouraged to make a multi-year commitment to follow the student's progress during the student's stay at the school. Students chosen for this program are among the most accomplished at the school and proud to be a recipient of this recognition.
